T-h-e c-a-t s-a-t o-n t-h-e m-a-t

"With your pointing finger ready, open up the book. What does the first page say? "T-h-e c-a-t s-a-t o-n t-h-e m-a-t". Excellent! Let us read it again, but this time, without sounding out the letters. Good job, Ashwin. High-five." Being a Teaching volunteer is so much more than the conventional teaching method: I know and you need to learn. As a volunteer you have the opportunity to get to know the children, learn more about what motivates them, and most importantly help build their self-confidence. Children in the working-class areas of Cape Town are too often told they are wrong, or stupid, or that they should only be seen and never heard. Your role is to help change this mind-set, by engaging with the children, asking for their opinion and constantly congratulating them for a job well done!

In the Literacy Project volunteers work with children (aged 7 to 10 years old), who have difficulty with reading and writing. The volunteers work the children in small groups, and each lesson is meant to stimulate a love for reading, and the child's active engagement with the world. These creative lessons require a lot of preparation. Each week at the Teaching Workshop, volunteers learn new ways to work with the children, and help increase the child's vocabulary. A greater vocabulary means a greater ability to read. Eventually the children will be able to process much more than the simple words "T-h-e c-a-t s-a-t o-n t-h-e m-a-t." The children will know what kind of cat sat on the mat. What the type of mat is being sat on? Why did the cat sit on the mat as opposed to on the tiles? All the possible questions needed to encourage an active mind.





Behind the scenes of the Journalism Project | Journalism Project update

"I had the great opportunity to experience the life of a Journalism volunteer and staff member of the Journalism office. During that time I learnt exactly what a volunteer does in this office. The volunteers get the opportunity to go out and see, learn and explore Cape Town. The volunteers go out, gather as much information as possible and write one print feature and four online articles for the Cape Chameleon (Projects Abroad magazine) a month. Volunteers arrive from many different countries in Europe and the US; some are interns from university or gap year students that just finished High School. Many copies of the Cape Chameleon magazine are printed each month and distributed in book stores, coffee shops, NGOs, schools and at events. The project has many different aspects, not only for writing but photography as well. The Cape Chameleon has abundance of pictures and some non-professional volunteers who like taking photos have even secured cover or inside featured shots in the magazine.

Voices of the World is an initiative where volunteers go and visit local high schools, and educate the students about journalism in South Africa and offering them the opportunity to write for the Voices of the World website, which is also updated in many other destinations.

Corinna Hofmarcher is an 18 year old female from Austria at our Projects Abroad Human Rights Office (PAHRO). Her passion to help other people has led her to our Human Rights Project, where she wanted to do more community work and assist where she can. She recently finished High school and is now currently in her gap year. Corinna wants to study law when she heads home after her 11 months of volunteering.

3 Months before Corinna joined PAHRO, which is situated in Rondebosch, Cape Town; she was doing a care project in a informal settlement called Vrygrond, Cape Town for 4 months. She assisted teachers, looked after children and attended to their needs. "The teachers in the crèche have a lot of children to look after, so they always need help from outside," she mentioned. She loved every responsibility she had, from preparing the children's food, feeding them, reading the stories, and keeping record of each and every individual present. She still has the same passion at PAHRO. "There is always a lot of work to do in the office, and you need a lot of volunteers to work on every case, otherwise you cannot help the clients," as she explains her workload. She also mentioned how amazed she was at Project Abroad that opened their own Human Rights Office and allowed the volunteers to assist their staff in helping people who can't afford legal aid. At the project her duties include working on real cases and consulting people who are in need of help.

She mentioned that PAHRO has been very useful to her because she realized that she wants to study law. "A lot of the clients have difficulties in their own lives and have a lot of problems. However they are very glad when you try to help them, just by doing research, phone calls and emails, you help them a lot."

Her most memorable moment as of yet is when she re-visited her care project a few weeks after she had left. "They all screamed my name when I walked through the door!" She loves the interesting lifestyle of the locals, the ocean, mountains and Cape Town as a whole.
